Dr. Russell R. Dynes is a co-director of the Disaster Research Center, Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio 43201, as well as acting chairperson of the Department of Sociology at the university. His book, *Organized Behavior in Disaster*, is one of the few theoretical statements on disasters available.

Dr. John Gange was until June of 1974 Professor of International and Public Affairs at the University of Oregon, Eugene, Oregon 97403, at which time he attained Emeritus Professor status. As a former Director for 12 years of the university's Institute of International Studies and Overseas Administration, he has done extensive research and written copiously on refugee settlement, American foreign policies, and various aspects of the NATO countries.

Dr. Philip S. Hall, a clinical psychologist with his own current private practice at the Tri State Clinic, Belle Fourche, South Dakota 57717, was the Evaluation Analyst for a United States federally funded, post-disaster crisis intervention program after the Rapid City disaster. He was assisted in his evaluation by **Patrick Landreth** now in government service in Denver, Colorado.

Dr. Benjamin McLuckie of the Department of Sociology at the University of Delaware died on March 17, 1975, several days after submitting the draft of his article to this journal, and this version has been edited from that draft. A Ph.D. in sociology, McLuckie had written widely on the warning process in disasters.

Professor Robert Stallings is in the School of Public Administration and on the staff of the Institute for Disaster Preparedness at the University of Southern California, Los Angeles, U.S.A. He has done extensive research on a variety of topics from crisis management to warning systems to hospital problems in emergencies, and is presently concerned with overall problems of disaster planning and implementation.

Dr. Dennis Wenger, an Associate Professor of Sociology at the University of Delaware, Newark, Delaware 19711, did the research for his article with two students, **James Dykes** and **Thomas Sebok** at the same university and also **Joan Neff**, currently a National Science Foundation fellowship holder at Ohio State University. Wenger is involved in further studies on the concept of disaster subculture, and is also doing research on community power structures as well as co-authoring a textbook on collective behavior.

R.F. Cumberland is manager of the Chemical Emergency Centre. During nineteen years at Harwell he has gained extensive experience in the safe handling of hazardous materials. He was educated in Birmingham and Oxford and is a licentiate of the Royal Institute of Chemistry.
